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REPORT

-OF THE-

Auditor of the Territory of Arizona.

OFFICE OF THE TERRITORIAL AUDITOR, PHOENIX, ARIZONA, JANUARY 1, 1897.

To His Excellency, B. J. Franklin, Governor of Arizona.

SIR:

I have the honor to submit herewith the Biennial Report of this office, showing in detail all transactions connected therewith from January 1, 1895, to December 31, 1896, and in submitting this statement permit me to say that the expectations of the taxpayers of Arizona have been fully realized by the strict and rigid application of economy which has prevailed in the various departments of the Territory during the past year, as the figures tabulated herein will verify.

The Territorial Prison since its inception has been the great vortex into which upwards of one-quarter of the gross revenues of Arizona has been poured—many new and vexatious problems have been offered by legislation and otherwise whereby this expense was to be reduced, yet up to date nothing tangible has been produced, aside from official integrity and efficiency, and the application of these good qualities under the present administration has been productive of the results long sought. The cost of maintaining the Territorial Prison for the years 1894

and 1895 was \$100,086.89; the average number of prisoners during these two years was 153, with an average cost per capita of 89 cents. This was quite a reduction from the previous two years, yet in 1895 and in 1896 the inmates had increased till the average for these two years had reached 184; but notwithstanding the increased ratio of inmates, the cost of maintaining the institution was reduced from \$100,086.89 to \$81,125.98—a net saving of \$18,910.91, to be placed to the credit of the years just closed, or a per capita of 56 cents; thus a clear saving of 37 per cent was effected.

The laws under which public officers operate have much to do with the efficiency of the service; no official can produce good results from an inefficient statute; no public officer can secure economical results while operating under a cumbersome or ill-advised statute: and while not deeming it advisable to enter into the details of the operations of the Board of Control, yet much of the credit for the marvelous savings effected, as shown above, was secured by abolishing many useless boards and the substitution of the Board of Control, or some similar centralized authority The fact of the enormous savings in every detherefor. partment the past two years must be attributable to some economic measure, which is deserving of further investigation and trial; for instance, there was drawn from the General Fund of the Territory during the years 1893 and 1894, \$216,849.83, and during the succeeding two years of 1895 and 1896 there was drawn from this same fund the sum of \$165,667.25-a net saving of \$51,182.57 for the two years The General Fund, it must be remembered, is the noted. fund from which is paid the current expenses of the Territory, and the fact of making a saving of 25 per cent. of the gross expenditures of the Territory is one that appeals with force and reason to the taxpayers of Arizona, and that the system that brought about this greatly desired object should be continued goes without saying.

The law-making bodies of States and Territories are always desirous of securing such laws as will put the burdens of taxations equal upon the people; equitable taxation

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is one of the most essential and vital objects of every Legislature, and to this end I would recommend that the National Banks of Arizona, which now go untaxed absolutely, be made to bear their just share of the Territory's burdens, and to this end I think a law ought to be enacted by the Nineteenth Legislature whereby these large moneyed institutions within our Territory may be made to contribute their legitimate portion of taxes. While I fully realize the great benefits that flow from corporate powers and corporations, yet I feel that as the revenue laws of Arizona are now administered the corporations escape taxation to an extent that is not creditable to the law-making powers of the past. Pullman and express companies pay little or no taxes, yet both draw largely on the finances of the Territory for their support.

But the great tax evader, the insatiable maw, that takes all that comes to its hopper without any appreciable returns, is the great mines of Arizona; these immense bullion producers, while daily sending beyond the confines of Arizona bullion to the value of thousands, pay not one dollar in taxes; yet these corporations will assert that they are largely instrumental in the development of Arizona and its mining industry, and a tax on the product of their mines would work great hardships. We find such mines as the Jerome, Congress, Copper Queen, Clifton mines, and dozens of other large bullion producers, whose capital stock is up in the millions, yet not one of the companies mentioned pay taxes on one-twentieth of the value of their properties. Nevada and other mining States and Territories tax the net proceeds of all mines; Arizona had a similar law on its statute books for years, but by the cunning device of large mining corporations, working through paid lobbyists, this just and equitable law was repealed. I think the re-enactment of that law would be an act of justice to the cattlemen, farmers, and all other taxpayers in Arizona, and I respectfully recommend that it, or a similar law, be put on our statutes, and thus let the burdens of taxation fall equally upon all.

As shown by the report of the Territorial Treasurer, there was paid for interest on the floating debt in 1895, \$83,425.00, and in 1896, \$88,000.00, which certainly should be included in the total expense of running the Territory.

Warrants on all funds except the General Fund have been redeemed by the Treasurer, and the following is a statement of the General Fund:

INSANE ASYLUM.

Around this institution centers the greatest interests of the people of Arizona; every county, city and village is represented within its spacious walls, and its management is of a necessity of the greatest importance to the citizens

and taxpayers. The management of this home of the Territory's demented has been, and is, creditable to the Territory; every effort is put forth to make the inmates comfortable and contented. The cost of maintaining this institution for the past two years has been made less per capita than in a former like period, yet this can and will probably be reduced in the coming two years, as the application of the same stringent business principles will reduce this cost to a minimum. The number of inmates of the asylum for the years 1893 and 1894 was 107, and the cost of the institution for the years mentioned was \$51.579.61. The number of inmates for the years 1895 and 1896 was 154, and the cost of maintenance was \$51,855.88 for this period; added to this sum is \$2,500.00, which was expended for the purpose of heating apparatus and an unsettled account of years' standing, which was enforced by the court, hence this does not properly belong to the current expenditures. It will be seen that while the number of inmates increased to a considerable ratio during the past two years, yet the gross expenditure increased only \$275.27. This carries its own recommendation and endorsement of the system in vogue at the institution. The buildings are in good repair, farm and grounds are neatly kept, and the entire surroundings are in harmony with the needs and requirements of an efficient administration of affairs.

NORMAL SCHOOL.

This educational institution, located at Tempe, has and is giving evidence of its great usefulness as a public educator.

The buildings were found to be much too small for the purposes intended, and a liberal appropriation was made for larger and more suitable buildings by the Eighteenth Legislature.

The amounts expended the last two years for buildings and other purposes were \$38,526.96. The new buildings which are being constructed by legislative appropriation are not yet completed, but the money so far paid out

in such construction seems to have been judiciously and economically expended, and if the same care is exercised in the future as in the past as to its details, Arizona will have a Normal School of which her people will be justly proud.

CAPITOL GROUNDS.

This handsome tract of land, consisting of ten acres, situated in the western portion of Phoenix, was donated to the Territory for capitol site purposes, and is now one of the ornamental parks of Phoenix; it is artistically laid out with numerous walks, blue grass lawns, shade trees, palms, roses, etc., and is creditable to the Commission having the grounds under their supervision. The cost of maintaining this park for the years 1895 and 1896 was \$2.245.42; of this sum there was an unexpended balance on hand at the beginning of the year 1895 of \$205.28. The amounts appropriated by past legislatures for the care of these grounds has been insufficient and in no wise equal to the sums annually expended on such large parks in other localities. For the proper care of ten acres of highly cultivated land would require the service of at least two and sometimes three experienced men; this would in justice necessitate an appropriation of \$2,000.00 annually. This would enable the Commissioners to seed the balance of the acreage in blue grass and otherwise beautify and ornament the grounds and properly care for the same, and to meet this I wish to recommend that the Nineteenth Legislature appropriate \$4,000.00 for the purposes mentioned.

The failure of the passage of the appropriation bill necessitated extreme economy in expending money for the care of these grounds, as will be seen that in the year 1895 \$1,293.00 was spent for salaries, etc., and in 1896 only \$952.43 was utilized for the entire maintenance of grounds, purchase of lumber for bridges, etc.; and in closing I wish to reiterate that this amount ought in the least to be doubled in order to secure satisfactory results.

TERRITORIAL UNIVERSITY.

Few educational institutions in the west have grown

to such a magnitude and given such universal satisfaction to the public as the University of Tucson. Magnificent buildings, pleasantly located and admirably managed, and its beneficent influence is fast being recognized throughout the Territory. The Legislature ought to foster this great institution, and continue to aid its advancement by proper legislation.

The records of this office show that there was expended for its maintenance in 1895, \$5,496.80, and in 1896, \$6,989.28, making a total for the years mentioned of \$12,486.08.

REFORM SCHOOL.

The Legislature, in its wisdom, provided for the construction of a Reform School at Flagstaff, and levied an assessment for its erection; the building is partially completed, and is regarded by competent architects as the finest and best constructed building in Arizona. The material used in the construction of this school is sandstone, taken from the great deposits close by the beautiful town in which the school is situated. There has been expended in connection with this institution during the year 1895, \$22,540.01, and in 1896, \$5,833.75, making a total expenditure of \$28,373.76, and the building is yet in a state of incompletion. The architect in charge estimates that to complete the building as was contemplated in the Act which created it would require an additional expenditure of \$20,000; the building is in a condition which demands the immediate attention of the Legislature. The Territory has expended a large sum of money upon its construction, and in justice to the Territory it cannot be permitted to become a wreck. Certainly something ought to be done about this Reformatory, and that at once. The building was intended for a reformatory institution for youths, and the records of the courts disclose the fact that very few, if any, inmates for this institution are now incarcerated in the penal institutions of Arizona. This will be taken into consideration by the Legislature, and may govern its dealings with this problem.

PRISON FUND.

The amount drawn on the Prison Fund for the years 1895 and 1896 was \$12,659.12, which was expended in repairing the prison; the improvements made by the above expenditures were water works, electric plant, new buildings, etc. The improvements were greatly needed in conducting the institution.

INSANE ASYLUM IMPROVEMENT FUND.

There was expended on the improvements at the Insane Asylum for the years 1895 and 1896, \$25,280.48, which improvements were foundation walls, sewerage, plumbing, plant for light, water and heating purposes, water closets in the wards, plastering, building of laundry, bakery, refrigerator, etc. There was also purchased ten acres of land for garden purposes.

BOARD OF EQUALIZATION.

The Board of Equalization during 1895 and 1896 had an expenditure of \$3,598.50. It will be seen by the tabulated statement that the rent of the office of the Auditor and Board of Control has been charged to this account, while it really is not an expenditure of the Board. I would recommend that the Auditor's clerk would have the duties of Secretary of the Board of Equalization imposed upon him, as the records of that office are kept in the Auditor's office, and he would always be there to attend to his duties. In making the above change the Territory would be saved \$300.00 a year.

TERRITORIAL MILITIA.

In looking over the expenditures of 1895 and 1896, it will be observed that the Territorial Militia was no small factor in the expense account, and when the benefits acruing from that organization are set up against the money spent in its maintenance, I am at a loss what conclusion to arrive at. Is or is not this organization worth the money expended in keeping it up? During the two years just passed the Arizona militia cost the Territory \$9,228.54, divided as follows: 1895, \$4,334.06, and in 1896, \$4,94.54; of this last amount \$1,774.54 was expended by order of the Governor, Hughes, who ordered out the militia to stop a presumed prize fight that was supposed to take place in El Paso, Texas. This expenditure in the light of subsequent events was inexcusable, and while probably authorized by law, was in no wise necessary to the preservation of law and order in this Territory.

The benefits arising from the existence of the militia does not, in my opinion, equal the heavy cost of its maintenance, and I think the militia law ought to be amended whereby this great outlay can be curtailed.

SANITARY COMMISSION.

Few, if any, of the authorized Boards of Arizona have attained such beneficial results for the money expended as has the Live Stock Sanitary Commission, and as the stock industry of the Territory increases as rapidly as it is at present, the usefulness of this Commission will increase. The members of the Board—Cameron, Tovrea and Richards—are all practical, able men, and devote much time to the business of the Territory.

Colin Campbell, Chairman of the Commission, is one of the most capable, efficient men for the position he holds that could be found in Arizona, and devotes a large portion of his time to the duties of his office. As cattle importations become more common and cattle are brought into the Territory from all sections of the country, disease in various forms will of course be brought with such stock; to prevent the spread of such forms of ailments is one of the most arduous duties of the Commission, and Veterinary Surgeon Norton and Chairman Cameron are always on the alert, to investigate, prevent and stamp out the spread of such disease.

The labor of this Commission in the Salt River Valley alone the past year resulted in great saving to the cattlemen, and prevented the spread of strange ailments which inexperienced stockmen are wholly unable to treat. Late legislative enactments have strengthened the hands of the Board, and made it much more efficient and able to carry out the intentions of the law-makers, which could be further improved by additional legislation along similar lines. The cattlemen of Arizona pay a large percentage of the Territorial taxes, and the Legislature in giving them just recognition is doing its duty by a class of thrifty people, who are doing much to develop and build up the Territory.

The Commission expended \$8,979.42 for the years 1895 and 1896, apportioned as follows: in 1895, \$4,909.58, and in 1896, \$4,069.84, and I believe that the money was well and judiciously expended, and has proven a good investment for the taxpayers of Arizona.

ESTIMATES.

The amount drawn on the various funds of the Territory for the years 1895 and 1896 was \$341,705.41. Out of this amount there was over \$100,000.00 spent for improvements, which deducted from the total expenditures would leave \$241,705.41 for the total running expenses of the Territory. This does not include the amount paid for interest on the bonded debt by the Territorial Treasurer. Upon this basis I estimate the amount of revenue required to meet the current expenses of the Territory, not including the interest, at \$250,000.00.

APPROPRIATION FAILURE.

The failure of the Eighteenth Legislature to enact an appropriation bill for the current expenses of the years 1895 and 1896 has given not only the Territorial Auditor, but all parties having dealings with this Territory, considerable trouble and annoyance, and it is to be hoped that such an occurrence will never again transpire in Arizona. In the performance of my duty I have endeavored to conform strictly to the law, but the failure of that appropriation bill has hampered me materially in the exercise of my official duties. There are numerous expenses connected with the business of this Territory which cannot and are not provided for by statute, and these necessary expenses

are all to be provided for by legislative appropriation; hence the failure of that measure has in many cases worked inconvenience; but acting under the advice of the courts and the Attorney General of the Territory, I have succeeded in defraying many of the needed expenses, which will be found in detail in this report. The condition of the affairs of the Territory brought about by the failure of the appropriation bill to become a law has, in my opinion, necessitated the immediate passage of a deficiency appropriation bill to cover the expenses created by the failure of the Eighteenth Legislature to appropriate, and I recommend that the Nineteenth Legislature at its earliest convenience pass such deficiency bill, so as when it is making up its regular appropriation bill at the last of the session they can act more intelligently and without regard to existing conditions. The items contained in the bill formulated by the Eighteenth Legislative Assembly, but which failed of passage, will in connection with official reports furnish all the data necessary for the deficiency bill. Such action on the part of the Nineteenth Legislature will work material benefits to existing conditions which are not wholly satisfactory to officials at present.

Upon motion of Mr. Underwood that the report of returns of the telegraph line be returned to Mr. Colquhoun, as they do not come under the jurisdiction of this Board, but under that of the Supervisors. All members voting aye, the motion prevailed.

Mr. Boone, having been over the road often, was requested by the chair to give his opinion as to whether the assessment should be lowered or not. Mr. Boone stated that the only reason for such reduction was that the mines of the Detroit Copper Company having been shut down, the revenues of this road were greatly decreased.

Mr. Underwood moved the assessment of the Arizona & New Mexico Railroad be allowed as returned, at \$2500 per mile. Motion prevailed, Messrs. Underwood, Boone and Leitch voting aye and Mr. Goldwater nay.

The assessment returns of the property of said company in Arizona for 1895 are in detail as follows, viz: Forty-one miles at \$2500 per mile is \$102,500, which is the assessed value of the property of said company in Arizona, and other property to the amount of \$19,143.24; total, \$121,643.24.

Upon motion of Mr. Goldwater, all members voting aye, that the New Mexico & Arizona Railroad, whose assessment returns were not yet in, should be assessed at the same rate as last year, \$5671.05 per mile, with the additional 30 per cent penalty as provided by law, for failing to make their returns. It was also agreed if the road could show good cause why assessment was not in, the penalty should be removed at the meeting of the Board to be held in August.

The assessment returns in detail for this road were declared to be as follows:

Eighty-seven and eight-tenths miles at \$5671.05 per mile is \$497,918.19, the assessed value of the property of said company in Arizona.

The Board ordered blanks prepared to be sent to the County Supervisors for their county assessment.

There being no further business before the Board, adjournment was taken in due form till the second Monday in August.

The minutes of this meeting were read and approved.

August 12, 1895.

In accordance with Paragraphs 2657-8-9, Chapter of the Revised Statutes of Arizona, 1887, the Territorial Board of Equalization of Arizona met this day at the office of the Auditor of the Territory of Arizona, in Phoenix, Arizona, at 10 o'clock A. M.

There were present:

C. P. Leitch, auditor, member of Third District, and M. Goldwater, member of Fourth District.

Absent:

H. D. Underwood, member First District; H. C. Boone, member Third District, and Hattie Schriver, secretary.

There being no quorum, the Board adjourned until 10 o'clock A. M., August 13, 1895.

August 13, 1895.

Pursuant to adjournment, the Territorial Board of Equalization met this day in the office of the Auditor, at Phoenix, at 10 o'clock.

There were present:

C. P. Leitch, auditor, and Morris Goldwater, member Fourth District.

Absent:

H. C. Boone, member Third District; H. D. Underwood, member First District, and Hattie Schriver, secretary.

There not being a quorum present, the Board adjourned until 10 o'clock, August 15, 1895.

August 15, 1895.

Pursuant to adjournment, the Territorial Board of Equalization met this day in the office of the Auditor at Phoenix, Arizona, at 10 o'clock A. M.

There were present:

C. P. Leitch, auditor, member Third District; H. D. Underwood, member First District; H. C. Boone, member Second District, and Morris Goldwater, member Fourth District.

Absent: Hattie Schriver, secretary.

Minutes of previous meeting read and approved.

A communication was read from Hattie Schriver, secretary, tendering her resignation as secretary of this Board, to take effect from date. It was moved by H. C. Boone, and seconded by H. D. Underwood, that the resignation of Hattie Schriver as secretary of this Board be accepted, same to take effect at once. Carried, all members voting aye.

Upon motion of H. C. Boone, seconded by Morris Goldwater, that A. M. Franklin, of Phoenix, Arizona, be and is hereby appointed as secretary of this Board, said appointment to take effect at once. All members voting aye, the motion was carried.

Mr. A. M. Franklin hereupon accepted the secretaryship, thanked the Board and assumed the duties of his office.

Mr. J. A. Naugle, general manager of the New Mexico & Arizona Railroad, and Colonel William Herring, attorney for said road, were upon motion granted an immediate hearing.

Colonel Herring said that he appeared before the Board to show reason why the New Mexico & Arizona Railroad failed to have its returns in the hands of the Board within the statutory time—reason being the delay in the transmission of same from one inspecting officer to another of the company—that returns were made out in due time and form, there being no intention to evade any of the statutory requirements—and he asked that the action of the Board adding a 30 per cent penalty to their assessment be reconsidered.

After a full discussion of the question it was moved by H. C. Boone, seconded by Mr. Goldwater and carried, all members voting aye, that the penalty heretofore imposed upon the New Mexico & Arizona Railroad Company of 30 per cent on its assessed valuation for failure to make returns as required by statute, be and the same is hereby rescinded.

It was moved by H. C. Boone, and seconded by M. Goldwater, that the returns heretofore filed by the Arizona & New Mexico Railroad Company for the year 1895 be and

the same is hereby considered as filed within the statutory time and that the Board now proceed to act upon said returns. Motion carried, all members voting aye.

Upon motion carried, final action upon said assessment was deferred to a later hour.

A communication was received from Wiley L. Jones, Esquire, District Attorney, Graham County, asking that the Board place upon the assessment roll of Graham County the property owned by the Globe & Gila Valley Railroad claiming that under Section 2649, Revised Statutes Arizona, 1887, the law granting said road exemption from taxation was illegal.

Upon motion all members voting aye the communication was laid on the table, the Board not feeling called upon to take the initiative in the motter.

Upon motion carried, all members voting aye, a recess was taken until 2 o'clock P. M.

Two o'clock p. m., meeting called to order, all members present.

There appeared before the Board, F. N. Nellis and E. J. Babbitt, on behalf of the taxpayers of Coconino County. Upon motion corried they were granted a hearing. Mr. Babbitt asked for relief from the Board for his county, stating that the Board of Supervisors of his county had caused to be listed each and every piece of property, both real and personal, to the full limit, and that each piece or parcel was valued at more than the full cash or market value, thereby being able to reduce their county tax levy for the year to a moderate sum, preferring to do that rather than to assess, as in years gone by, at a lower rate, and thereby be compelled to establish an excessive tax levy, they now find it is also going to cause them to pay a large Territorial tax, which will be a heavy burden on them, and therefore ask such relief as the Board could give in the matter.

Upon motion, carried, the further consideration of the

above was laid upon the table until general county equalization matters are reached.

The Board then proceeded to take up the matter of returns as made by the New Mexico & Arizona Railroad Company.

The following motion was made by M. Goldwater, Esq., and seconded by H. C. Boone, Esq.:

That the assessment of the New Mexico & Arizona Railroad Company be fixed at the rate of \$4900.81 per mile, which said assessed valuation is made up as follows: Road bed, per mile, \$4500; all other property, both real and personal, at the rate of \$400.81 per mile (being an acceptance of the valuation as returned by said company on all property except road bed) total length of said road being 35.40 miles in Cochise county and 52.40 miles in Pima county.

Motion carried, H. C. Boone, H. D. Underwood and M. Goldwater voting aye, C. P. Leitch voting nav.

Upon motion, carried, Board adjourned until 10 o'clock A. M., August 16, 1895.

August 16, 1895.

Board met pursuant to adjournment. Present C. P. Leitch, auditor, member Third District; H. D. Underwood, member First District; H. C. Boone, member Second District; M. Goldwater, member Fourth District, and A. M. Franklin, secretary.

Minutes of previous meeting read and approved.

J. M. Murphy, Esq., District Attorney of Mohave county, appeared before the Board. Upon motion, carried, Board granted Mr. Murphy a hearing.

Mr. Murphy first asked that the recapitulation of the assessment of the Atlantic & Pacific Railroad be again officially reported to the clerk of the Board of Supervisors of Mohave county. Upon motion, carried, the secretary was instructed to furnish the information desired. Mr. Murphy also addressed the Board in reference to the assessed valuation of property in his county as per returns heretofore before the Board.

Upon motion, carried, the above matter was laid upon the table, to be taken up at a later date.

The Board then took up the matter of examining the returns of the different counties.

Upon motion, carried, the Board took a recess until 2 o'clock P. M.

At 2 o'clock p. m. the Board came to order. All members present.

Communications and other matters that came before the Board during the afternoon were disposed of.

Upon motion, carried, all members voting aye, the Board adjourned until Monday, August 19, 1895, at 10 o'clock A. M., in order to grant the secretary time to tabulate the work before the Board, as also to perform other clerical work required.

August 19, 1895.

Board met persuant to adjournment this day at 10 o'clock A. M. Present C. P. Leitch, auditor and member Third District; H. D. Underwood, member First District; H. C. Boone, member Second District. M. Goldwater, member Fourth District, absent. A. M. Franklin, secretary, present.

Minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved.

W. L. George and J. T. Priest, members of Board of Supervisors; H. C. Orme, Assessor, and Jerry Millay, District Attorney of Maricopa county, appeared before the Board, asking that they be heard in reference to returns made by Maricopa county.

Upon motion, carried, the Board laid aside all other business and granted each of the gentlemen a hearing.

They in turn discussed at length with the Board matters in reference to the returned valuation of land, cattle, horses and sheep of their county.

Upon motion, carried, this matter was laid upon the table, to be taken up later.

Lincoln Fowler then appeared before the Board and was granted a hearing in reference to assessment of swine. No notice taken.

J. D. Monihon also appeared and addressed the Board in reference to City of Phoenix property and the improvements thereon, with the relative burden imposed upon improved as against unimproved property.

Board upon motion, carried, took a recess until 2 o'clock p. m.

At 2 o'clock P.M. Board convened. All members present except M. Goldwater.

After working upon different county returns, Board upon motion, carried, adjourned until August 20, 1895, at 10 o'clock A. M.

August 20, 1895.

Board met pursuant to adjournment, all members and the secretary being present.

The minutes of last meeting read and approved.

The Board then proceeded to canvas the assessment returns of the different counties. The returns were upon motion laid upon the table for future reference.

After full discussion of the question in reference to the assessment or assessing of the property of the Pullman Palace Car Company, the following motion was made, duly seconded and carried, all members being present and voting aye.

That the rolling stock of the Pullman Palace Car

Company used on the Santa Fe, Prescott & Phoenix Railroad, and in constant use thereon, be assessed as follows, to-wit:

Two Pullman sleeping cars at \$10,000 each, \$20,000, and the pro rata of said assessment for each county is as follows:

The valuation placed upon land acreage in the different counties was then taken up for consideration. It was found that there was a grave error in the returns of Cochise County, and the following telegram was forwarded.

To the Supervisors of said county:

"Your assessment returns last year show 46,200 acres outside of grant lands. This year returns show 10,000 acres. What causes the difference in acreage? Answer fully by wire." Pending answer thereto land valuations were passed.

Upon motion recess taken until 2 o'clock P. M.

At 2 o'clock P. M. Board came to order. All members present.

The Board then proceeded to compare general county valuations, as also to inquire into each County Funded Indebtedness. As full information was not at hand, the Board sent a request to the Territorial Treasurer, asking for a full statement of Territorial and County Funded Indebtedness.

Upon motion Board adjourned until 10 o'clock A. M., August 21, 1895.

August 21, 1895.

The Board met pursuant to adjournment, all members and secretary present.

Minutes of previous meeting read and approved.

The following telegram received from W. A. Harwood, Esq., clerk Board of Supervisors of Cochise County, in reply to wire sent on 20th inst.:

"Send you by to-day's mail corrected abstract."

The Board fearing there might be some delay in the arrival of said returns, instructed the secretary to wire as follows:

"Answer our telegram by wire; we cannot wait for mail."

After attending to routine work, upon motion of Board they took a recess until 2 o'clock P. M.

Two o'clock P. M. Board came to order. All members present.

The Board then took up the returns of the valuation on cattle in the different counties for adjustment. Upon motion of Messrs. Underwood and Goldwater, all members voting aye, it was ordered that a raise of 10 per cent be placed on all cattle in Maricopa County. Upon motion of H. C. Boone and M. Goldwater, all members concurring, it was ordered that the valuation placed in all the other counties on cattle stand without change.

It was unanimously ordered that the valuations on horses, asses, sheep, swine and goats stand without change in the several counties.

Upon motion of Messrs. Goldwater and Underwood, all members voting aye, it was ordered that the valuation on mules be raised 25 per cent in Yuma County, and in other counties stand without change.

Under the caption of "All Other Property," the personal property of the several counties was considered.

The valuation placed upon land (acreage) in the different counties was then taken up. Upon motion of Messrs. Boone and Underwood, all members voting aye, all acreage land in Cochise County was raised 50 per cent, and no change made on the values returned by Navajo, Apache, Coconino and Gila. Messrs. Goldwater and Boone moved that no change be made in the land values in Graham, Pima, Pinal and Maricopa Counties. All members voting aye.

Messrs. Boone and Underwood moved, all members voting aye, that all acreage land in Yuma County be raised 40 per cent on the valuation returned by said county.

Messrs. Goldwater and Underwood moved that no change be made in the land values returned by Mohave and Yavapai Counties. All members voting aye.

Upon motion of Messrs. Underwood and Boone it was unanimously ordered that the valuation upon city and town lots in Maricopa County be raised 10 per cent.

Upon motion of Messrs. Boone and Goldwater that the valuation on city and town lots in Yuma County be raised 10 per cent.

Upon motion of Messrs. Goldwater and Boone it was unanimously ordered that the valuation placed upon city and town lots as placed by the returns made by the several counties—excepting Maricopa and Yuma County—stand without any change.

Messrs. Underwood and Boone moved, all members voting aye, that the valuation placed upon improvements on town and city lots, as placed by the returns made by Yuma County, be raised 15 per cent.

Upon motion of Messrs. Goldwater and Underwood it was unanimously ordered that the valuation placed upon improvements on city and town lots, as per returns made by the several counties—except Yuma County—stand without any change.

Upon motion Board adjourned until 10 o'clock A. M., August 22, 1895.

Pursuant to adjournment, the Territorial Board of Equalization of Arizona met this day in the office of the

Territorial Auditor, in Phoenix, at 10 o'clock A. M. Present M. Goldwater, H. C. Boone and H. D. Underwood, members; A. M. Franklin, secretary.

Upon motion, carried, Mr. Underwood acted as chairman pro tem.

Pursuant to adjournment the Board met this day, all members and Secretary present.

The Board proceeded to consider the matter of assessing forty-two Burton stock cars, leased by the Maricopa & Phoenix Railroad from the Burton Stock Car Company, of Boston, said company having failed to pay taxes on same.

The following resolution was offered by M. Gold-water:

Resolved, That an assessment of forty-two stock cars be and is hereby made against the Burton Stock Car Company, of Boston, Mass., for stock cars leased to and used by the Maricopa, Phoenix & Salt River Valley Railroad Company, and the value of the forty-two cars is hereby fixed by this Board at \$200 per car, and the Board hereby adds to the valuation the penalty fixed by law, to-wit: 30 per cent for failure to make returns. The minutes of the previous meetings, held on August 12 and 13, 1896, were read and approved.

The Secretary reported receipt of returns from Cochise County of abstract of assessment roll of said county for 1896; also letter from the County Recorder of Gila County stating positively that returns had been mailed.

Telegram was received from Clerk of Board of Supervisors of Mohave County in reference to acreage as per their abstract of assessment roll.

The Board then proceeded to examine and compare returns as made by each county with returns made in previous years. After making a careful examination of all returns it was moved and seconded:

That the Board proceed to examine and compare the returns made by the different counties on Real Estate and Acreage, as per tabulated statement made by Secretary to facilitate the work.

It was finally ordered upon motion of M. Goldwater and G. W. Skinner, all members concurring, that,

Whereas, The returns from Yuma County for the year 1895 show 78,982 acres, valued at \$306,773.30; and

August 15, 1896.

The Board met this day pursuant to adjournment at the office of the Territorial Auditor at 10 o'clock A. M.

There were present M. Drachman, M. Goldwater and George W. Skinner, members, and Auditor C. P. Leitch and Secretary Franklin.

Minutes of August 14, 1896, were read and approved.

The Board then proceeded to examine and compare land values of the different counties.

It was moved by Goldwater, seconded by Drachman that the land values as returned by the several counties, except Yuma, Mohave and Gila, remain as returned, Goldwater, Leitch and Drachman voting aye, Skinner no; carried.

The Board then took up for adjustment the valuation returned on town and city lots in the different counties.

Upon motion of M. Drachman, seconded by Geo. W. Skinner, it was ordered, all members voting aye, that the valuation placed upon town and city lots in the Territory should stand as returned by the different counties withont change.

Upon motion of M. Goldwater and M. Drachman it was ordered, all members voting aye, that the valuation placed upon mules, asses, sheep, goats and swine in the Territory should stand as returned by the different counties without change.

The Board continued to examine and compare values of personal property, next in order being horses.

It was moved by M. Goldwater that the valuation on horses remain as originally returned by each county. Lost, not having a second.

The Board then proceeded to lengthily discuss the question of valuation of horses as per returns.

Upon request of Auditor Leitch, M. Goldwater took the chair.

Upon motion, carried, Board took a recess until 2 o'clock P. M.

Two o'clock P. M. the Board was called to order, all members and Secretary present.

The Board again took up for consideration and action the values upon horses by the different counties.

Upon request of Auditor Leitch, M. Goldwater took the chair.

It was moved by Messrs. Skinner and Leitch that the assessed valuation of horses in Pima and Cochise counties be raised 10 per cent., Messrs. Skinner, Leitch and Goldwater voting aye, and Mr. Drachman no. Motion carried.

Pursuant to adjournment, the Territorial Board of Equalization of Arizona met this day in the office of the Territorial Auditor in Phoenix, with all members and Secretary present, at 10 o'clock A. M.

Minutes of previous meeting were read and approved.

The Secretary reported the receipt of returns of Abstract of Assessment of Gila County for the year 1896.

The returns of Gila County were taken up for consideration by the Board.

It was moved by Drachman and Skinner that tha valuation placed upon cattle in Gila County be raised 11½ per cent, Messrs. Skinner, Drachman and Leitch voting aye and Mr. Goldwater nay. Motion carried.

The balance of returns made by Gila County were unanimously ordered by the Board to remain unchanged.

The Board then proceeded to discuss the matter of failure of Mohave County to embrace in its Abstract of Assessment Roll for 1896 the surveyed and unsurveyed unimproved acreage, heretofore embraced in its returns.
