## PREFACE.

This Catalogue is issued not only for the benefit of those who may desire to consult the Library, but as somewhat of a guide to those who are collecting books on the Southwest. While it is very far from a complete list of books relating to this section of this country, yet it contains the names of most of those of value that can usually be obtained.

Many of the most important books on this general subject are in foreign languages, especially those relating to early explorations and discoveries; and a catalogue of the books in the Library of the Society in Spanish, French, Italian, German and Latin will be published in a short time. This will be found to contain some very early editions of books of the greatest interest and importance, as for example, an Italian translation of the Travels of Cabeza de Vaca, in the Ramusio collection, published at Venice in 1555, only 18 years after the events narrated; and a French edition of the Exploration of New Mexico by Espejo, published at Paris in 1588, but five years after the occurrences described.

Among the books of special rarity to be found in the present Catalogue are the Riggs Edition of 1851 of the Narrative of Cabeza de Vaca, The Spanish Conquest of New Mexico by Wm. W. H. Davis, and "Prose Sketches and Poems," the earliest work of Albert Pike, much of which was written in New Mexico in 1832.

The Society desires to possess every work written by a resident of New Mexico, and has grouped such books in Class G, in this Catalogue. Information as to other works of this character will be gratefully received.

All books are catalogued under the names of the authors, except when they are unknown, and in the case of Biographies, Class B, where the arrangement is by the names of the subjects.
